More Than a Ramp

The end game at North Carolina Baptist
Aging Ministry (NCBAM) is always
"more than." More than a friendly visit, more
than a grab bar installed, more than a ramp
built. For thousands of North Carolina

Baptists who help the frail aging in their communities,

the end game is sharing God's love with people who

find themselves in hard places.

Retired pastor, Daniel Wing, found himself in need of a ramp after an infection left him paralyzed from the waist down.

He needed a wheelchair ramp to leave his home and called NCBAM. Call Center Specialist Shirley Carlson worked with Regional Director Robert Leonard to locate volunteers and funding

could be built as one of the 20 projects planned for their "One Great Day" mission event held May 2, 2021.

Rev. Brandon King and a crew from First Baptist Church of New London responded, "Yep, we can do that!" Funding for the ramp was provided jointly by the Association, the church, and a matching grant from NCBAM.

Rev. King says that he was blessed more than Daniel Wing. King remembers, "The day before we built the ramp, Daniel and I prayed together and the Holy Spirit was so sweet on us. I knew instantly that we weren't there just to build a ramp. Daniel is a pastor who hasn't preached in a long time. Here was a man the church had forgotten about. Getting to know Daniel was an awakening to me. The Holy Spirit reminded me to slow down and remember the saints of the past."


Mr. Wing also feels blessed and very grateful for the ramp—and the extra blessing that came with it. "I got more than a ramp.

The most important part was the fellowship with Brandon King and the others who built it. I'll tell you this, Pastor King is a great man and he don't mind praying with you. They put the ramp in, brought gravel, and fixed it up real nice. And they brought us boxes of groceries for several weeks. I've only visited his church a few times, but they treated us like we went there every day. That's how nice they were to us."

Jennifer Snellings, administrative assistant at the Stanly-Montgomery

Baptist Association, says the ramp project ticked every box for their "One Great Day" event. "We don't want it to be just about the project. We want people to see the love of Jesus in action. Brandon and his crew are super missionaries in our community."

We are also **looking forward to hosting Camp BAM on June 23-27, 2022.** (See page 5 for more information.)


A note of appreciation from the son of two of our newest members who had been experiencing isolation and loneliness during the pandemic.

What does it mean to partner with NCBAM's Call Center?

It all begins with a phone call to the Call Center from an aging adult needing assistance with a safety concern–such as a

wheelchair ramp for a loved one to be able to get in and out of their home safely. **Call Center Specialists begin to reach out to churches in the individual's community.** We have been very blessed to partner with Baptist Associations and **hundreds of churches and volunteers** across **North Carolina that are eager and willing to help** those in need.

Volunteers donate their time and skillset to build wheelchair ramps. One of the main obstacles is the funding of ramp materials. Many times, older adults are on fixed incomes and have no means to contribute toward materials. Sometimes, churches are able to contribute both volunteers and funding.

What happens when funding is not available? We seek other community agencies and share an opportunity for service. Some Senior Resource Centers receive grant money to purchase materials. Or, we may contact local civic groups or Boy Scout troops that may be looking for a service project.

NCBAM Honored by NC's Division of Aging and Adult Services

The George L. Maddox Award recognizes an organization that has excelled in creative programming for older adults and is the most competitive award given by NC's Division of Aging and Adult Services (DAAS). Rebecca Freeman, Consumer Affairs and Legislative Liaison with the DAAS, presented the coveted award to NCBAM at the September virtual meeting of its Advisory Team.

Nominators included Holly Hight, a Caregiver Specialist with Lee County Senior Services, who wrote: "They are at the top of the game when it comes to creative and unique programming that has benefitted so many seniors around North Carolina.

Their programming has helped curb social isolation, create stimulating seminars and workshops, and provide ample opportunity for learning."

Carolyn Edwards, a member of the Aging Committee with the Baptist State Convention, also nominated NCBAM. She wrote: "Their creativity in designing programs has always surpassed our expectations.

Their programming remains current as they address issues confronting older adults. The NCBAM Hope Line has been a tremendous help to older adults in our state who are experiencing loneliness during the pandemic."

Camp BAM – Next at Kennedy **Home, and Your Church!**

The inaugural Camp BAM took place in June, 2021. Fifty intergenerational campers spent five days on the Mills Home campus of Baptist Children's Homes in Thomasville. Groups from FBC Concord and Impact Community Youth in



projects that served 45 individuals. Campers

built wheelchair ramps, installed handrails and smoke alarms, and presented digital literacy classes at local senior facilities. Campers were provided team-building activities, group devotionals, pool time, and also socialized with some of the children in care at Mills Home.

Camp BAM's Director, Samantha Allred, was thrilled with the outcomes of the first Camp BAM. "I stood on the lawn of a senior receiving a handrail in awe of what God was doing. All of us found it difficult to put into words how intentionally God was working in the lives of the volunteers."

Group leader, Rev. Martha McDowell, says her prayers were answered for the campers. "I wanted them to see that worship doesn't occur just in a sanctuary."

The next Camp BAM will be held in eastern North Carolina June 23-27, 2022. Based at the Kennedy Home in Kinston, campers will build ramps, install grab bars and smoke alarms, and assist with projects at the NCBAM Care Village. Campers pay a nominal fee; NCBAM provides ministry projects and materials, camp programing, meals, and lodging. Local churches and businesses support the Camp by providing donations for meals.

NCBAM also offers weekend camp experiences at your **church.** We'll support your mission-minded teams as they serve aging adults in your community!

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Letter from the DIRECTOR

"These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace."

- John 16:33

Peace Like a River

Singing hymns has allowed me to express worship and provided a strong foundation for my faith. One such hymn is, "It Is Well with My Soul." The lyrics speak of God's help in troubling times.

When peace like a river attendeth my way
When sorrows like sea billows roll
Whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say
It is well, it is well with my soul.

As I have aged, "peace like a river" has become more important to me. Some people call it "peace of mind" which means to have an overall sense of contentment or acceptance in certain situations. Words like still, calm, and satisfied can be used to describe feelings of peace. When a river flows, it goes either around or over obstacles. It flows without stopping. Peace like a river is peace that flows in our lives despite troubles or turmoil.

Our culture today seems to be one of tribulation. **Unrest causes stress and frustration**. An aging adult recently told me: "The past year was tough. Sometimes
I feel like giving up and want to feel and think nothing for a few minutes, to rest a bit."
In other words, "the sea billows roll" in this person's life. The Bible portrays the sea as the source of storms. Storms in our lives **cause us to feel restless and helpless**.



Having "peace like a river" starts with knowing Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

God's Word is filled with verses that bring peace in the midst of struggles. John 14:27 reads "My peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid."

Peace is a gift from God; all we have to do is accept it. Finding peace like a river allows us to sing the refrain of this hymn over and over: "It is well, it is well with my soul."
