## State Leadership Conference to Address Identity Theft



After two years of virtual events, **the AAIM State Leadership Conference will again be held in-person** – and also livestreamed on NCBAM's YouTube channel and Facebook page. Attendees at Bay Leaf Baptist Church in Raleigh will **enjoy visiting with select vendors, morning treats from Chick-fil-A, and a delicious lunch catered** by Raleigh's popular "The Forks."

The State Leadership Conference offers a chance for senior adult professional and lay leaders to learn helpful information to share with their groups. Senior adults are also welcome to attend. The event offers education, inspiration, and fellowship for all!

This year's conference will focus on the rise of identity theft, fraud, and scams against older adults. Seniors are so often targeted that identity theft has been classified a form of elder abuse in some states.

John Brown, outreach and policy coordinator with NC's Dept. of Justice, will share "How to Protect Yourself in the Digital Age." Scammers and con artists are always looking to take advantage of consumers. Reports of hacking, corporate data breaches, and cybercrime are on the rise. This session will include how to identify and address vulnerabilities in your personal data and online habits, add protections to keep your data safe, identify prevalent scams and frauds, respond if you think you've been scammed, and keep yourself and your information safe.

**Amy Burns, administrative assistant for NCBAM**, will share a personal story of her family's experience with identity theft. Attendees will **learn the warning signs of identity theft**, review tips for protecting senior friends and loved ones, and examine the steps necessary for recovery when identity theft has occurred. NCBAM regional directors Angie Gregg and Charity Johnson will cover how to implement and maintain a plan to prevent a home invasion or burglary. Attendees will learn who is most vulnerable to home invasions, how to avoid being targeted, and what to do in the event of a home invasion.

Michael Barrett, associational mission strategist for the Piedmont Baptist Association, will address "Security in Christ." While we may have to work to protect our identity in the world, our identity in Christ is secure, our inheritance is guarded, and we are protected in Him.

The conference will also feature **soloist Jenny Wayne** who serves in leadership with **Bible Study Fellowship** and is the **senior adult director at Mt. Vernon Baptist Church.** Wayne has performed with the North Carolina Opera Company and as a soloist for Narroway Productions. **She shares her love**

# NCBAM Care Village Offers "Koinonia"

When senior adults are asked, "what is most important to you as you age?," the most frequent answer is "independence." Seniors want to remain at home as long as possible. The mission of NCBAM encompasses that goal. Our programs and services increase safety and provide access to services so that aging in place is possible. Remaining in one's own home yields cost savings and improves quality of life and physical health.

Recently, North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) held a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the Kennedy Home in Kinston for the NCBAM Care Village. This new outreach enables seniors in the area to age in place safely at home and therefore delay or forgo moving to assisted living or nursing home facilities. Care Village members participate in assessments and receive individualized plans of care. Needs are met through community and church resources.

The village concept of **helping one another and sharing resources** is not new. Early Christian churches banded together to support each other. The New Testament uses the **Greek word "koinonia", meaning fellowship,** and living in community.

The NCBAM Care Village fosters Christian love. Staff and volunteers encourage members and provide support for their needs. We focus on following



Jesus and growing in faith.

The core values of the NCBAM Care Village foster independence, wellness, engagement, care, support, and Christian spirituality. We come alongside churches, not only in Kinston but all across the state, to provide outreaches like the Care Village to better serve aging adults and to glorify God.
